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

ARTICLES BY BETTY DENNIS

Back by popular demand, one of dear Betty Dennis' always interesting articles, this one dated April 5, 1977. This one takes us back to the days when the telephone was a novelty rather than something you carried around in your back pocket and used to snap memories of yourself doing something silly!

In 1878 the "Gleaner and Advocate" tells us it would "make cold shivers" run down a superstitious back to have sat in the telegraph office as a small party did on a Saturday evening. They heard "John Brown's Body"



sung at West Winstead, Conn. Those who were there knew it was nothing superstitious. It was simply a wonderful example of the workings of the wonderful telephone. Mr. Heath of our town had arranged for this telephone communication with the manager, C.K. Hun, of West Winstead. For over an hour speech and song were transmitted through the 64 miles of wire connecting the two operators. "Rock of Ages" was sung by Mr. Hunt, while Mr. McAlpine of Lee played a clarionet {sic} solo and the Winstead operator amazingly was almost able to identify the instrument. Conversation, however, had to be carried on in a loud tone, and even then all the words could not be distinguished though a sentence could be understood occasionally. The experiment, as a while, was far beyond the expectations of the operators.

In January the next year, a concert by telephone between Lenox and Lee was given. The music on the part of Lenox was remarkably fine, especially the flute and horn duet, and the Ocarina or "Potato Machine". The Lee music due to other engagements of the expected performers, was wanting, but several songs were sung and conversation freely carried on.

One of the first phones to be installed in Lee was at the home of John Dowd, Selectman from about 1861 to 1881. Because of his elected position in town a phone was deemed necessary. His home on Cape Street, East Lee, is still occupied.

MEET THE BOARD ELLEN WHITTAKER



"Ciao, come stai?" That's Ellen for "Hello! How are you?" Or, "Dia duit, conas ata tu?" That's Ellen asking the same thing in Irish. Like so many of Lee's population, Ellen's family history goes back to countries other than the U.S.A. Her paternal grandparents, Angela Trentin and Pietro Scolfaro, emigrated directly to Lee from Gambellara, Veneto, Italy in the Italian wine region. Pietro came to the United States first in November 1906 and once he was settled he sent for Angela in May 1907. Ellen's maternal grandmother, Mary Agnes Ruddy, was born in 1888 in County Mayo on the west coast of Southern Ireland. She moved to England and lived there for seven years before migrating to the United States and settling in

Manchester, New Hampshire.

She had a daughter, Kathleen, who was fostered soon after birth to two English sisters named Dawson. At fifteen, Kathleen moved to Lee from Methuen, Massachusetts to work for the Deely family on Whiteholme Road in Lee as a cook's helper. It was at a monthly card party held for the youth in town, organized by a women's group from St. Mary's Church, that Kathleen and Leo Scolforo met, fell in love, and later married and introduced Ellen and her three siblings to the world. The Lee Library Gallery is named after their middle son, J. Peter Scolforo. Peter served for many years on the Library Board and was very involved in the building of the addition. Ellen graduated Lee High School and went on to study for one year at North Adams State College (now Massachusetts College of Arts) and then began her career at Berkshire Life Insurance Company where she worked for thirty years and for ten years at Guardian Life Insurance. While working, she studied in the evenings at Berkshire Community College and then at American International College where she earned a Degree in Business Administration.

Far from being ensconced in a cubicle in an office at some lofty corporate building, Ellen actually often spent much time during the last twenty years of her career traveling either in the United States or from one continent to another. She was involved in lending corporate money to fortunate companies around the world and visited their facilities from as far as Australia to South Africa. Among other interesting destinations, her journeys took her to a gold mine and factories in South China.

Ellen has plenty of interests and hobbies to keep her active now that she's retired, one obviously being local history, and she has been a Board Member of our Society for the last two years, currently holding the position of Chairperson of the Program Committee. It's thanks to Ellen's industry that we can offer so many fantastic programs!

She is also President of the G. Marconi Lodge #1620, Order Sons and Daughters of Italy, aka Lee Sons and Daughters Italy. She can often be heard chatting away in Italian at the Cappuccino Club where members enjoy Italian conversation. And then she's a Commissioner for the Benefit Insurance Commission, a part of the Grand Lodge of the Sons and Daughters of Italy. Such a busy lady!

Somehow she manages to find the time to research family history, visit estate sales, tend her flower garden, and gather with friends and family for lunches and dinners. Her family includes husband Bill, children Michael and Karen, three grandchildren, and two greatgrandchildren.

Her ambitions extend to keeping our Society moving forward. This includes encouraging membership activity in our various projects and activities, finding the Society a permanent home, and to continue to promote the Society within the community.

Thanks to Caroline for the update Now we're all that little bit wiser. It's such a joy when we get feedback from our readers!






